Working with parents is an essential part of identifying our more able learners along with those whose demonstrate potential.

We use:

- ongoing classroom observations
- discussion with parents
- learners' own thoughts and ideas
- assessments as part of the ongoing learning journey ()

How do we support more able learners and those with extra potential?

'More Able and Talented' learners and those who demonstrate such potential are supported in a range of ways; we aim to provide a personalised approach to teaching and learning across our curriculum.

This might involve:

- Opportunities for learners to lead their own learning.
- Open ended activities which allow for creative thinking and independent choices.
- A greater level of cha<mark>lle</mark>nge in literacy, numeracy or digital skills.
- Access to a range of resources and materials.

Regular access to the outdoors.

How can you help and support your child outside of school?

Give them the tools and materials they need to succeed.

Don't assume they'll always be have the same talents, think flexibly and allow them to explore.

Provide intellectual challenges, question their thinking and encourage independence.

Be open-minded about their choices.

Encourage them to do things they find difficult, a Growth Mindset is important.

Communicate with school and let use know how we can help.
